Sustainability has become a driving force on campus this year and many departments are beginning to put "green" policies into practice — while the library has been doing it for years! What could be more sustainable than the library and who could have done it better? Instead of buying their own, many people use our computers, printers, books and other research materials. Numerous books, journals, indexes, reserve readings, and the Library 160 course materials are available to students online, eliminating the need for paper copies.

Yet, as we seek to be even more cost-effective, now and in the future, we must continue to try and meet the needs of a growing student population. Student enrollment for Fall 2009 is once again increasing despite the strained economy and is expanding the demand for additional classroom space, computers, and individual and group-study areas in the library.

In response, the room that once housed Interlibrary Loan and Document Delivery, will be re-purposed as a study area using existing furniture moved from other areas of the library. Because of its proximity to the Café, students will be able to have food and covered beverages in this room. The Newspaper Collection and New Books will also be relocated here.

And, the new multimedia classroom funded by the Roy J. Carver Charitable Trust, located in our Learning Connections Center, is under construction as this issue goes to print. Students, grad students and faculty will benefit in so many ways from this classroom. The librarians can hardly wait to have access to it for seminars and workshops.

These are challenging times for the University Library. Budgets have been cut, departments have tightened expenses, staff is finding creative ways to meet student expectations. Dean Madison announces Library Sustainability Taskforce

Iowa State University Library is starting on an exciting journey. President Gregory Geoffroy 's emphasis on sustainability inspired Dean Madison to form a library sustainability taskforce.

There are few more pressing issues than sustainability facing not only our university but our nation. The Iowa State University Library will play a vital role in prompting and modeling sustainable practices. Many of our library staff and faculty as well as students responded to the call to service on our taskforce. This taskforce will be

headed by Sarah Passonneau (Assistant Professor, Assistant to the Dean, ISU Library) and includes both senior and junior members of our organization.

Inspired by the three-legged stool of sustainability, the taskforce formulated three major areas of investigation: conservation, community and communication. The Library will audit internal practices, from library workspaces to student areas, under the conservation rubric. The Library will examine its role in participating with various colleges and

departments in our larger institution, collecting resources across all disciplines and developing subject guides for all ISU community members. Communicating our efforts is of vital importance. We will create internal posters in work areas for our employees, develop signage for our users describing our activities, and share best practice ideas.

Lastly, we hope to share our learning with other institutions in order to pave the way for greener libraries, universities and society.



On June 8, 1984, the building that had been known as the Iowa State University Library became the William Robert Parks and Ellen Sorge Parks Library. The dedication ceremony was on the west side of the library and included dignitaries such as Iowa Governor Branstad, as well as Dr. Parks, who was the university's longest-serving president and retired in 1986. Under Dr. Parks' leadership the university offered more comprehensive programs, and library resources tripled. Ellen Sorge Parks was a scholar in her own right and an avid library patron. Part of the dedication ceremony included the unveiling of a portrait of President Parks that is now in the library's Periodical Room with other presidential portraits. A joint portrait of William Robert Parks and Ellen Sorge Parks graces the library lobby today.

PARKS LIBRARY DEDICATED 25 YEARS AGO

The dedication ceremony was the culmination of four years of construction to add 66,328 square feet of usable space to the south side of the library, including state-of-the-art service areas for Special Collections, Circulation, Reference, Technical Services, and Media. The architects of the library addition were Charles Herbert and Associates. Library Dean Warren Kuhn initiated the project, sought funding, and oversaw the many details to bring the addition to successful completion. It was one of the major accomplishments of his long career.







Construction of the library addition began in August 1980 and it opened to the public on August 15, 1983, giving the front of the library a new façade. Part of the previous façade of the library is preserved in the four-story atrium in

the new addition. The construction of the addition was followed by several years of remodeling of the earlier structure in order to make effective use of the spaces and to unify the design.

The library addition could not have been completed without the support of many donors. The State of Iowa appropriated \$9.6 million in 1980 for the construction, furnishings, and equipment. The total project cost was estimated at \$13.1 million, so the rest needed to come from other sources, in which donors played a crucial role.

Many long-time library staff remember the energetic atmosphere, interesting inconveniences, and feelings of anticipation during the construction and remodeling years, followed by the excitement of being in the new spaces. During the construction, the formerly peaceful library was syncopated with the grinding of drills and pounding of jackhammers, powdered with construction dust, perfumed with paint and glue, and subjected to occasional power failures. The new spaces offered spectacular views of the campus, more seating and study areas, expanded room for library materials, improved service areas, and seamless incorporation of new technologies. Anyone who approaches the front of the library in 2009 can still appreciate President Parks' quote there that "The

Library uses certified paper in publications



VEISHEA 2009 Memories in the Making

The Library VEISHEA display included posting memories of faculty and staff. Visiting alumns were invited to add their memories to the display. These are just a few excerpts from the "memories" that were shared.

I Remember...

- "...coming to the Library to get enough peace and quiet to write a paper. There were no distractions and I was in a community of other researchers which encouraged me to complete my assignment. It felt very collegial and encouraging."
- "...when a helicopter landed on the front lawn of the library as part of the ROTC VEISHEA exhibit in the mid-1980s."
- "...I was completely intimidated by the size of the building. No matter where I was going I would only use the main stairway, out of fear of getting lost..."
- "...we didn't yet have an electronic security system, so staff were posted at the proctor's desk near the exit to check the purse or backpack of each patron leaving the building... worst part of the job was checking guys' gym bags."
- "...when assisting with a colleague's research project, we pulled hundreds of rarely used government documents. Inside one of the documents was an old, handwritten, checkout card with my dad's signature, checking out the book in the late 1960's."
- ...when my department head first got a home computer I was really puzzled why anyone would need one of those..."
- "...as I flipped through an Extension narrative report, I found a quote from my grandmother..."
- "...working on a term paper on Sino-Soviet border skirmishes. I was referred to the Government Documents unit and found a wealth of great material. I got a good grade on the paper and a good grade in my Poli Sci class."
- "...demolition of the old rotunda... the wrecking ball coming down on the concrete dome and bouncing back up and off the dome. It took several tries before the dome even cracked."



- "...the Grant Wood murals and entering the library from the east. As a student I used the card catalog and the reading room. It's a different library now, but I still come in to see the murals."
- "...I had a stranger come up to me and help me find a book when it looked like I was having trouble."
